Summit County West Nile Virus Surveillance - 2009

The three health departments in Summit County collaborate on West Nile Virus (WNV) Disease surveillance. This weekly report will run through October 2009 (or later if WNV is still a concern). The surveillance will include mosquitoes, birds, horses, and humans. It will include updates not just from Summit County but also from Ohio and the rest of the United States. It will also include web sites to get new or updated information regarding WNV.

West Nile Virus Tests Ordered in Summit County Hospitals

The ordered WNV tests will provide information on how often test are being ordered by physicians and the percentage of positive tests to those ordered. Tests numbers will be updated as labs report.

Reported aseptic meningitis cases, Summit County (confirmed and probable)

There tends to be more aseptic meningitis cases in the summer. While most aseptic meningitis cases are due to gastrointestinal or respiratory viruses, similar symptoms may be present with arthropod-borne diseases.

Bird Surveillance

The Ohio Department of Health is no longer testing dead birds.

Ohio Mosquito Surveillance

As of July 18th, 3,300 mosquito pools (117,097 mosquitoes) have been tested. One mosquito pool in Montgomery County tested positive. (Cumulative positives: 4)

Ohio Horse Surveillance

As of July 18th, 2 horse samples have been tested and the results were negative.

Ohio: There have been no human West Nile Virus cases in Ohio in 2009. Information on WNV can be found on the Ohio Department of Health website,

United States: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that, as of July 14, 19 states have reported birds, animal, and/or mosquitoes positive for WNV. There have been 8 human cases in the US from 7 states. Four cases were reported as meningoencephalitis and 3 cases as West Nile Fever and 1 case was clinically unspecified at the time of reporting.
